

# SHS Museum Now ADA Compliant

During the fall and winter of 2005 the Shrewsbury Historical Society had a handicap-accessible earthen ramp, landing and second exit/entrance to the museum added on the rear of the building.

A graveled parking area for handicap parking has also been added which leads to the horseshoe-shaped earthen ramp, making the museum ADA compliant.

The installation of the ramp and exit/entrance makes the museum available to all but also makes it safer in case of an emergency.

A small part of the sanctuary floor had to be removed to make a 4' wide passageway level with the existing floor. In removing the floor, a wooden box top was found with the words "Sundries - F. O. Fosters, Cuttingsville" stenciled on it which may have been used as a shim when the church was renovated in 1890.

Al Ridlon Builder Inc. of Cuttingsville was awarded the bid for the projects. The firm is known for their quality workmanship and has recently worked on Marjorie Pierce's house for the Preservation Trust of Vermont.

# Quest for Genealogy

The year 2005 was a busy one for our genealogist, Nancy Spencer. With the availability of the Internet, people from far and wide have been able to search out their roots.

Wendy Kuntz, who resides in Hawaii, contacted the Society for information as to the burial site of her ancestor, a Revolutionary War soldier, who had lived in Shrewsbury, named Samuel Low. By researching the books the Society has on our local cemeteries, it was found that Samuel Low and his wife, Abigail, were indeed buried in the Center Cemetery.

On a beautiful day in September, Wendy, her parents, who live in Ludlow, brother and aunt visited the museum, and after exchanging information and photos with the Society, followed us to the Center

Cemetery and were led to the grave sites. They thought the cemetery was beautifully kept and were very touched with the fact that a new American flag was placed at Samuel's grave site. A simple headstone reads, "Samuel Low, Died Sept. 17, 1839, Aged 81 years." It was explained that every Memorial Day new flags are placed on all veterans' graves.

Committees and members of the Shrewsbury Historical Society have had a busy year once again. A few people have accomplished much to better the museum and its place in our community.

The House Committee has been busy planning and constructing an earthen ramp in the rear of the building. The entrance/exit door and a few finishing touches are left to do to make the museum handicap accessible. # Society Celebrates 35th in 2006

The Shrewsbury Historical Society was formed in the year 1971 and nominated Arthur Patten to be its first President. The membership grew and after years of keeping artifacts in boxes and bags, were able to move to the second floor of the town library which became the first museum of the Society.

In March of 1999 members began preparing the Cuttingsville church building for a new museum and grand opening which was held in August.

In June the Society will celebrate its 35th year.

They received negative comments and told that they did not realize all the obstacles involved. All the way home in the car, Arthur was upset and sputtered that "nothing would deter them from starting up the society."

Dorothy Turnbeau said that when she received the invitation it brought back many memories, mainly of the meetings held in various homes in the town.

# Vermont History Expo 2005



The Shrewsbury Historical Society once again joined 145 other historical societies of Vermont in presenting an exhibit at the Tunbridge Fairgrounds on June 25 and 26, 2005.

Exhibiting in a special arena devoted to architecture, the Shrewsbury Society presented a pictorial wall featuring the "Shrewsbury Community Meeting House Continuity and Change: 1806 to 2005."

The four wall panels show photos of townspeople and events held at the Center, and an artist's conception of what the first Community Center might have looked like. Two large spectacular photographs of the Community Center in fall and winter, taken by the Society's photographer, Richard Wiedmann, rounds out the display.

If you missed seeing it at the Expo, the museum committee has added it to our standing exhibits.

# The Fair... Then and Now

When the forty-second annual fair of the Rutland county agricultural society closed, the Rutland Herald on September 23, 1887 printed some of the events and winners and their premiums. Under "Potatoes", G.H. Burr of Shrewsbury won first premium of \$2. "Oats" first premium of \$1 was issued to John P. Williams of Shrewsbury. "Stock Horses" stallion 4 years old, Lyman Aldrich of Shrewsbury was second with \$4. "Third Class Jerseys", E.B. Lord of Shrewsbury won second premium of \$2. "Working Oxen" trained steers went to Charles Aldrich \$5 and Eaton Lord, \$3, both of Shrewsbury.

The ladies of Shrewsbury and Cuttingsville shown in the Floral Hall Premiums with wool bed quilt and rug making. They were Mrs. O.M. Baker and J.W. Kenney.

Under Maple Syrup, D.H. Cook of Shrewsbury won \$1. Special mention of "Discretionary Premiums" brought a diploma to Charles Aldrich of Shrewsbury who exhibited a hitching post, unique in design and useful where considerable freedom is desired for the "hitched" animal.

This year's one hundred and sixtieth annual fair prizewinners were: Shrewsbury Historical Society's president Marguerite Ponton won first place and Best in Show in the Grange competition of "Tea Time" featuring fall flowers in a tea pot. Marguerite also won a second place ribbon in the Grange competition of "America the Beautiful" red, white and blue flower arrangements. Shrewsbury's Donna Smith won second place for her maple cake in the maple novelties competition.

# Calendar Notes for 2005

### January

Mailed to the Vermont Arts Council a signed copy of contract between the Society and the Arts Council regarding matching grant in amount of \$4,638 for construction of earthen ramp, landing and second exit/entrance to the museum.

The SHS applied to the Town of Shrewsbury requesting \$2000 for help in maintaining and operating the museum. Request was approved in March.

#### February

Sen. Hull Maynard agreed to attend Grant Award ceremony at the State House in Montpelier to accept the matching grant award on behalf of the SHS.

Updated information with Vt. Historical Society pertaining to "Passport to Vermont History" booklets which are given to museum visitors.

#### March

Patricia and Donald Oresman of Shrewsbury and New York, new life members.

#### April

Annual Meeting and election of officers was held April 21st.

#### May

On Sat., May 28th, the Fund Raising Committee held a successful Plant an Bake Sale on the lawn of the museum. The moneys raised came to \$625. The SVFD tent was much appreciated as well as all the homebaked goodies, cash donations and garden treasures from members and friends.

#### June

History Expo 2005 was held in Tunbridge, June 25-26. Fran Patten, Nancy Spencer and a graphic designer worked on an exhibit pertaining to the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Community Center.

# July

The museum opened for the season on Sunday, July 3<sup>rd</sup>. The museum hours this year remained the same: Sundays, 1 to 3 p.m.

# August

Addition to "In Memory Of" Scroll in honor of Tilton Richards, requested by Mt. Moriah Lodge #96 of Wallingford.

Interview committee met with Steven Martyn at museum and videotaped Steven's memories of

Cuttingsville and Shrewsbury, and added footage later of Edna Martyn on her porch with her son, Steven.

# September

Secretary presented to Society an album containing e-mails and color photographs of Shrewsbury, England received from Mr. Colin Hose of our sister town in England.

#### October

On Sat., October 15<sup>th</sup>, the Fund Raising Committee held a successful Fall Food Fest, inside the museum where it was warm and dry.

#### November and December

On Nov. 16<sup>th</sup>, Mountain School's third, fourth, fifth and six graders visited the museum with their teachers.

On Dec. 6<sup>th</sup> interviewed Anne Nancy Spencer for our collection of videotapes.

# 1881 Marker



Shown above is a photograph of a marker found on property of Con and Ruth Winkler in Cuttingsville, located high on a hill overlooking Laurel Glen.

The marker reads: "Fountain Reservoy of Laurel Glen Mausoleum June 1881."

Upon investigation, the marker which is on the ground beside a huge water cistern, was placed there to supply waters used by John Bowman for the Laurel Glen Cemetery, fountains, conservatory and the mansion itself.

The pipe which led to the cistern has long since been broken and the well is dry.
