

It is with sadness that the Shrewsbury Historical Society had to report on the passing of two Shrewsbury women, both Life Members, who were brave and courageous, and hard workers in every aspect of their lives. We miss you both.


Lucille W. Fiske passed away at age 88 on January 25, 2018 while living in Pennsylvania near her daughter Connie. Lucille was the wife of the late Clinton G. Fiske. She was a teacher for 30 years and then she and Clint operated the Haunted Mansion Book Shop in Cuttingsville after retirement. The Fiskes were also Life Members of the Historical Society.

Being an active quilter, Lucille enjoyed her role in preparing a Quilt Show held in the museum one summer. She also displayed many of her quilts at a special Fall Festival held by the SHS in the Town Hall in 2003. Beds were brought in and dressed with her creations. It was a perfect crisp fall day, with the aroma of fried apple fritters wafting out into the rooms. Also offered were interesting tag sale items, pumpkins and flora, which were displayed outside the Hall in an old farm wagon.

Later, when spring arrived in the village each year, Lucille and Clint would often wear the turquoise jewelry they purchased while wintering in Arizona and offered at their small shop in the Old Brick in Cuttingsville.

Edie M. Clark, formerly of Shrewsbury Center, passed away at age 94 in her Maples home with her daughter and daughter-in-law by her side on Tuesday, February 27, 2018, after bravely and quietly losing her battle with cancer. Bud and Edie had lived in their beautiful home that Bud built in Shrewsbury Center until recent years when they moved to Rutland. Edie's husband Bud passed away last year.

Both Edie and Bud joined the Shrewsbury Historical Society and were Life Members for many years. Edie helped move all artifacts from the 2nd floor of the Library over to our new museum location at the church building in Cuttingsville. Bud was our treasurer for many years. Both donated their garden's prettiest flowers each year for our Spring Plant and Bake Sale. The Clarks were a fearsome duo when the Society held their annual croquet games on Don and Lois Butler's lawn, opposite the Museum.

A Special Visit

On Sunday, May 27, 2018 the SHS opened its doors to the families of Edward J. and Irene Cook. Daughter Carole Cook Hass and husband Gary, invited the many relatives who attended a special get together in Laurel Glen Cemetery that day, followed by a visit to the museum to peruse the table of Ed and Irene Cook's memorabilia donated by Carole.

Children were especially curious about the exhibit of Victorian era toys. The SHS offered special rolled up copies of the Charter, tied with twine, that was issued by the Royal Governor of New Hampshire, Benning Wentworth, in 1761. The Charter designated 24,000 acres of land to be known as the Town of Shrewsbury. One little tyke was running past us holding one of these scrolls high in the air. When I asked him what he had there, he delightedly shouted "It's from George Washington!".

When Grace Brigham, our President of SHS walked in, there were many hugs and happy greetings from many of the young folks present for they were once students of Grace when she taught in Mountain School.

The following day, the families of George and Laicita Cook attended the military burial of Laicita Cook in Laurel Glen Cemetery. She was a WAC in WWII.
